For example, if "maid" is described as "a little sweet" and associated with "her grandma," it can be inferred that "maid" means "girl." Similarly, "velvet" leads to "little red riding hood" through the phrase "a cap of red," indicating that the hat is red. In practice, students must translate based on relevant context to accurately convey the ideas and meanings expressed in the sentence ^[10].

4.2. Applying English rhetoric

In the process of translating relevant English sentences, the integration of context can enhance the role of

rhetoric and present the intended meaning, ideas, and concepts more convincingly and appealingly, thereby achieving the purpose of language expression ^[11]. Take "He can stretch his dollars by leaving this city" for example. This sentence implies: "He can stretch his dollars by leaving this city, and he will have enough money to spend." In translation, the word "stretch" primarily denotes physical stretching, but in this sentence, it is used figuratively. It is translated as "to have enough money to spend" or "to be open to spending." Additionally, "dollars" in the plural form further emphasizes the uniqueness of the phrase ^[12]. Therefore, to maximize the expression of rhetoric in English translation, it is essential to ensure its alignment with a specific context. Understanding and mastering the correct structure of the text and the sentence is imperative ^[13]. Only then can rhetorical devices yield unique effects. However, during the application, caution should be exercised to avoid extracting words from context and merely grasping their surface-level rhetorical meaning ^[14].
